

Mapping Deathscapes (Suvendrini Perera & Joseph Pugliese eds.) offers a critical and creative analysis of the innovations of Deathscapes, a transnational digital humanities project that maps the sites and distributions of custodial deaths in locations such as police cells, prisons and immigration detention centres. An international team of authors takes a multidisciplinary approach to questions of race, geographies of state violence and countermaps of resistance across North America, Australia and Europe.

Nicole Watson belongs to the Munanjali and Birri Gubba Peoples of Queensland. Nicole is a legal academic who has an interest in creating ways in which Indigenous peoples' stories can be included in judicial decision making. She is currently employed as the Director of the Academic Unit in the Nura Gili Centre, University of New South Wales.



Yannick Giovanni Marshall writes in Black Studies. Yannick is an assistant professor of Africana Studies at Knox College. He completed his doctorate in African Studies at Columbia University with a dissertation on whiteness as police-state in settler-colonial Nairobi. Bertrand Tungandame was born in Rwanda. He migrated to Australia in 1997 and started working with SBS in 1998 as a content producer for SBS African, SBS French, and Living Black Radio and NITV Radio. He is currently working as Acting Executive Producer NITV Radio. His main interests are history and human rights concerns.



Goldie Osuri is Professor of Sociology at the University of Warwick. Their teaching and research years have been spent on the lands of Dharawal, Wurundjeri, Kaurna and Dharug nations and the UK. They have been researching sovereignty, colonialisms and nationalisms across Australia, India and Indian-occupied Kashmir.
